Book Week brings a very special atmosphere to Ainslie School and we are excited to be celebrating new and favourite stories in classrooms this week.

We signalled the start of Book Week with Reading Hour on Saturday evening. It was such a pleasure to be amongst our community, enjoying the Goodwin Library as we immersed ourselves in books. The incredible Anney Medhurst ensured the titles that were honoured with Children's Book Council nominations and awards were on display. This year's winners are:

- the Book Week Character parade on Friday morning at 9:15am.

### **University Connections**

Our involvement in the University of Canberra's Initial Teacher Education Clinics in Mathematics, Science and Physical Education commenced last week, bringing 5 tutorial sessions and 130 preservice teachers to Ainslie. Feedback from our Kindergarten, Year 3 and 4 students suggests that Week 1 was a resounding success with the 'Uni People' they met.

The cycle of learning that occurs through this work is so rich. Along with the obvious development of teachers of the future, the approach supports our students, who will experience carefully designed intensive group learning opportunities over 10 weeks. While they are at work, our teachers and support staff have opportunities to reflect on their own practice, as they share knowledge of their students and curriculum. They also enjoy opportunities for close observation of their students.

On orientation, we remind our preservice teachers that a significant responsibility they have during their time at Ainslie is to ask many questions. Through responding to their inquiries, our teachers reveal the philosophy and theory that rests behind what can become routine, habitual practice. This ensures our work with children continues to be mindful and intentional. We benefit enormously from critique and exposure to the new and emerging research, strategies and technology that our University partners bring.

This week, we also enjoyed visits from Dr Tessa Daffern (whose data collection for her research into spelling is almost complete), Professor Jaekyung Lee (from the Graduate School of Education, State University of New York), and UC Centenary Professor Moosung Lee. It was an honour to share my perspective of the Principalship with researchers of international acclaim, and very special to watch our students interact so confidently with them as we toured the school.

### **Student Leadership**

There is widespread agreement in education circles about the importance of students lending their voice to decision making. We know it is even better when students take action.

We are grateful to students who have taken carriage of ensuring the contents of our Senior Playpod meet the rigorous safety standards they have designed. This has involved an extensive audit of the loose parts in the container, and commissioning staff to ensure its appropriate disposal.

This Wednesday's Drought Relief fundraiser is another example of students demonstrating thought, research, collaboration and persistence in taking an idea from a concept to a reality. How impressive it was to be presented with planning documentation including a risk assessment in an initial meeting this team of senior students arranged.

We know that real contexts provide opportunities for deep learning. As we seize incidental opportunities such as these for inquiry and action, educators enable students to grow and demonstrate the knowledge, skills, attitudes and values that empower them as citizens.

### **Learning with Experts**

Real world learning was also on show with our Kindergarten students during the Supporting and Linking Tradeswomen (SALT) workshops last Friday. It was incredible to watch these very young learners at work with purpose, tools and expert mentors. We thank Sophie, Sascha and Jessica (George B's mother) for initiating this opportunity, and we hope to see a return of the SALT team in the near future.

We are also very grateful to the parents, neighbours and friends who visited classes to share their work during Science Week last week.

Hea-Jin (Nestor's mum) talked with Reid Preschool about how the bacteria lactobacillus turns milk into yoghurt.

In 3CC Julia Turner showed us how to extract DNA from strawberries and Natalie Bateman will be presenting a science experiment to our class on Wednesday

For Science Week, Year 4 was excited to have two visitors to our classroom. On Wednesday Dr John Young, Associate Professor at UNSW and Aeronautics Engineer came and talked with us about how aeroplanes fly and how vortices are created. We had fun using a vortex generator to blow over some plastic cups from quite a distance! On Friday Dr Carol Quashie-Williams an Entomologist from the Department of Agriculture came to talk with us all about insects, we discussed metamorphosis and looked at some yummy insects we could eat! Thanks to Anushka's mother Aarti who arranged for her work colleague to come in. Thanks also to Seb's Dad John whose enthusiasm for flight engaged us all in making paper planes.

### **Staffing News**

Students, staff, and Year 4 parents have welcomed Chris Wells back to school this week. Chris returns with the fresh perspective of a first-time parent, and is enjoying the learning that has come from his new role!

With Chris' return to Year 4W, Greg Taylor will be spending a little more time teaching Year 4A, while Rachel Appleby spends Thursdays and Fridays with Year 5 VH for the remainder of the term.

### **Music News**

The Arts is holding a strong position in Term 3 programs with rehearsals underway for our Limelight performances next week. Our Voices and Prep Choirs, bands and ensembles are also sounding impressive in preparation for performances at Floriade.

Ainslie School is well represented by committed musicians who are part of the ACT Primary Concert Choir. This group meets every Thursday afternoon through the ACTED Instrumental Music Program. We congratulate Amelia B, Christopher F, Elise R, Gabrielle D, Mia C, Paige von B and Sascha P for their continuing work with this choir, and on their performance at the Australian National Eisteddfod last week. We are very proud.


